Early Intervention for Below 6

VBRI-EI is one of the innovative and efficient programs of Amar Seva Sangam. It is an early intervention program for children with developmental delay and disabilities from birth to 6 years. By using mobile based technology-Enabling Inclusion App, children's developmental progress, staff rehab visits, parents' empowerment and satisfaction are measured on real time basis.

Two types of facilities are available: Home based and Centre based.


In home based program, trained community rehab workers visit the families of children with disability once in a week and give early intervention training to parents; these CRWs are guided by rehab professionals who visit the children once in a month. The impact of therapeutic intervention is evaluated once in 6 months.

Early Intervention outreach centres are located in 8 towns in Tenkasi district. Parents bring their children to the centres and get therapeutic services.

Early Intervention for Below 6


This year we have **served 803 children** (actively receiving services) in 8 blocks of Tenkasi district.

Affordability and Accessibility of rehab services for children with disability in the rural areas are limited.

This program has 4 types of services

Home/school based services: For Children with disabilities in the school going age (7 to 18 years)

Parents Managed Respite Centres. For children with disabilities (7 to 16 years) Vocational training centers: For Adults with intellectual disabilities (Age: 17 to 30 years)

Mental Health Program: Adults with Mental Illness (Age: 18 and above)



The organization's activity level never went down below 60% and it was lowest in the month of June 2021, but picked up and as on end August we are about 90% of the regular operational level. In the process, Amar Seva Sangam lost opportunities on manufacturing garments for the Tiruppur export requirements and also on the various productions which could have given some supporting revenues. The contributions from the general public also have come down drastically and the challenges to overcome them are to be faced, so that the year ending March 2023 ends with a positive financial result

The opportunities that we had were very exciting as we were able to get the Government partnership on the key area of district Early Intervention and also the progress towards getting the Early Intervention at the State level being made a big headway with the help of Amar Seva Sangam's aggressive lobbying which has resulted in the Government announcing a substantial portion of their World Bank supported project towards Early Intervention for the coming years. Amar Seva Sangam hopes that this opportunity that has opened up would result in our organization getting the direct implementation partnership with the Government in various other districts also in addition to the four current districts in which we are operating with the Government of Tamil Nadu. We have also entered into partnership with four NGOs in different States in India including Uttar Pradesh, west Bengal and Assam where we have started scaling up through them our Early Intervention model. The negotiation with the World Bank in Ethiopia is in a very advanced stage and would start implementing in another couple of months. Other World Vision supported negotiations in Albania and in the state of Andhra Pradesh are in advanced stages of getting finalized.

The school going children model is also getting good support from the Government of Tamil Nadu in its Samagra Shiksha Abhiyan program. Amar Seva Sangam hopes be a full-fledged knowledge partner with them to help them develop a separate application similar to our Enabling Inclusion which can be used by Amar Seva Sangam also for our other partnership or scale-up purposes. This way Amar Seva Sangam's brand and image will get a substantial boost and the Centre of Excellence will start moving with the right acceleration in a progressive manner. The discussions with the National Health Mission regarding the scale up in other parts are also going on even though at a slower pace. We have also successfully utilized the solar energy which has mitigated the electricity cost by more than 40%.

PAC Renovation:

The renovation for the Post-Acute Care Centre is also complete with the terrace being laid with tiles and improvements in their toilets.

7. Formation of new social enterprise - ASGA

We have established a separate social enterprise Amar Seva Global Association which is looking into the development of partnerships with NGOs and providing support to them with the help of the Enabling Inclusion App.

8. Fundraising:

The efforts to establish a fundraising mechanism is also taking shape with a consultant being hired to provide us standard operating systems and standardize the audio visual and stationary for the organization including the presentations for the donors and a mechanism for promotion through social media.

Outlook for the year 2021-22

Outlook for the year 2021-22 as mentioned is challenging and exciting as well.

We need to spend the unspent money under the Income Tax Act to the tune of more than INR 2 Crores which is earmarked for spending on infrastructure development for the organization. The compound wall, check dam and building for Centre of Excellence in rehabilitation and development of the Children with Disabilities in the upstairs of the existing Admin Block are some of the planned projects out of this amount.

The training hall for the various initiatives towards our own workers and other NGOs and Govt. staff and also the parents and other stakeholders is under construction with the support of Sanmina Group of Companies under CSR, from Chennai.

The extension of the 23 blocks with the support from the Tamil Nadu Govt. till 2023 is also on the anvil. The partnership with the Samagra Shiksha Abhiyan with Education Department of Tamil Nadu Govt. in implementing the inclusive education strategies through our own Enabling Inclusion technology in a modified form is also under way.
