Amar Seva Sangam has now entered its 29th year after a humble start in 1981. It is our great pleasure in presenting the activities during the year 2009-2010.

The efforts and achievements of Amar Seva Sangam, during the past 28 years, have been recognized by many in India and abroad and today we are considered as the one of the best Institutions in the service to the Disabled.

1. The major highlights of the year are as under :

a) REC Project

A separate training and development department in Amar Seva Sangam with a view to enlarge the education and training aspects was proposed. Since Amar Seva Sangam has been pioneering rehabilitation and education for persons with disabilities during the last 28 years and our vision is to create this area as a model "**Valley for the Disabled**" where there will be equality of rights, status and opportunities for all including the disabled. Our approach is inclusive whereby our services are offered for both disabled and non-disabled with the disabled persons being provided free services. The rehabilitation is holistic and the services include physical/medical, education from nursery to higher level college education, skill development and economic livelihood subsistence. A large community based programme called as "Village based Rehabilitation" is a part of our initiative where more than 13000 persons with disabilities are offered door to door services with the aim to integrate them in the society. Our mission is to empower the disabled persons and look at them as any other citizen and be a contributing factor for the development of society.

b) Awards and Recognitions

- 1.1 "Best Social Worker Award" given to the Secretary Sri S.Sankara Raman on August 13, 2009 by Bharathidhasan University, Trichy.
- "Best Institution for Women Welfare –2009" by Government of Tamilnadu to the Secretary Sri S. Sankara Raman on August 15, 2009 at Chennai.
- 1.3 "Human Educationalist Award" given to Executive Committee Member, Dr. S. Sumathi on September 05, 2009 at Tirunelveli.
- 1.4 "Madura Maa Manithar Award" Chennai, given to President, Sri S. Ramakrishnan on October 22, 2009.
- "Best Social Service Award" given to Sri S. Sankara Raman, Secretary on December 15, 2009 by Human Rights Organization at Tenkasi.
- 1.6 "IBN7 Super Idols Award" to Sri S. Sankara Raman, Secretary on January 17, 2010 at Mumbai.







c. Friends in need are friends indeed

Handicare International, Canada, headed by the President Smt. Sulochana Krishnamoorthy along with dedicated and supportive team of Directors as also family members continue to give Amar Seva Sangam unflinching financial support and guidance to enable the Sangam to function smoothly and to achieve its goal. During the year they donated a sum of Rs. 42.44 lakhs to cover many inmates under almost all the sponsorship schemes of Amar Seva Sangam. e.g. Kamadhenu Scheme, Special feeding, Sponsor-a-Child scheme (under this many children have been sponsored), Campus feeding on various days and Special equipment for extracurricular activities and play equipment for the home as well as Sangamam Special School.

From a donation of Rs. 6.00 lacs in 1999, year by year the amount has been gradually increasing and for the year 2009-10 it was Rs. 42.44 lacs.

The donations have gone a long way in the growth of the centre as also the progress of the children. New and modern facilities have/are being implemented and the continued support of Handicare International will always make our hands strong to face any challenging situation and come out of it successfully.

d. Major Events

- 1.1 CENTRE FOR SPECIAL EDUCATION This centre funded by Handicare International, Canada was inaugurated on May 08, 2009 by His Holiness Swami Dayananda Saraswathi. For the first time in the history of Amar Seva Sangam a Souvenir was released. During this function His Holiness graciously donated a sum of Rs. 5,00,000/- for laying of concrete roads inside the campus.
- 1.2 The Nippon Hostel for Physically Challenged girls, Nippon Barrier-Free Dining Centre and common kitchen were all inaugurated on July 1, 2009 by The Consul General of Japan, Chennai, Mr.Kazuo Minagawa.
- 1.3 A special spinal cord injured patients get-together was organized for three days at Amar Seva Sangam premises between July 8 and 10, 2009.
- 1.4 On August 29, 2009 Kavingnar Kanimozhi, M.P. visited the Sangam and spent a very enthralling evening with the children of the Sangam.
- 1.5 On October 2, 2009 United India Machine Company, Tirupur, were magnanimous in donating five electrically powered sewing machines for use at the Sangam's Tailoring Unit.
- 1.6 In Chennai, Amar Seva Sangam participated in the fair organized by Global Foundation for Civilization Harmony (GFCH) held between December 24 and 26, 2009. Several well wishers, VIPs and public attended the exhibition as also the inauguration programme.

Several items were displayed at the stall of Amar Seva Sangam. The performance of the Sangam children during the inauguration was very much appreciated by all. The Karnataka Chief Minister Sri B.S. Yedurappa, Hon'ble Governor of Tamilnadu Sri Surjitsingh Barnala participated in the inauguration programme. During the fair our Hony. Secretary was interviewed by Hello FM Radio.

- 1.7 From January 24 to 26, 2010 Amar Seva Sangam held a get together of past and present Disabled Youth Trainee Students (DYTS), when an Alumni Association was formed to enable the students to interact more often and to exchange notes on their progress and development as an outcome of empowerment.
- 1.8 February 20, 2010 was a memorable day for us, since it was not only the Sangam's School Foundation Day but it coincided with our getting water connection from Thamirabarani River (the only river which never dries up even in the summer months). Thus, hopefully our water problem stands to a large extent reduced. This occasion was graced by Sri M. Jeyaraman, Collector of Tirunelveli District.

e. Other Highlights

- 1. We eagerly continue to participate in the Mumbai Marathon, Diary Project and other fundraising activities both in India and abroad organised on our behalf by our donors; this has helped not only in mobilizing funds but also enhancing Amar Seva Sangam's image. It will not be an exaggeration if we say that today the name of Amar Seva Sangam is synonymous to many as a Centre that has taken up the cause of differently abled in a holistic manner
- 2. Constitution of Finance Committee : A Finance Committee has been constituted for the Sangam and while oral consent has been obtained from Mr. Sivakumar who will be the Chairperson for the Committee, Mr. Balasubramanian has been nominated as a member. The other members of Finance Committee will be Mr. J.V. Ramanujam, Internal Auditor, Mr. M.R. Seetha Raman, Bangalore, Mr. T. Prakash and the Working Committee Members of Amar Seva Sangam will be the other members.
- 3. From June 1, 2009 our day school Sivasaraswathy Vidyalaya has been upgraded from Middle School to High School.
- 4. Opening of Cash Credit Account Rs. 50 lakhs limit: Since heavy cash advance during the peak season is needed to be given to the suppliers of materials to our Note Book Making Section, Tailoring Section and Diary Project, there is a cash crunch which affects our activities. In order to overcome this situation the Working Committee resolved to open a Cash Credit Account with a maximum limit of Rs. 50 lakhs in IOB, Ayikudy.
- 5. Usha Fire Fund Raising Programme: Usha Fire Company conducted a Training Programme on safety for the benefit of Amar Seva Sangam on June 26, 2009 and handed over a cheque of Rs. 1.21 lakhs. The Secretary participated in the programme and thanked the company and the participants for organizing such an innovative programme.
- 6. On upgradation of our middle school to high school Lions club, Chennai have been very magnanimous in donating science lab equipment for the school laboratory.
- 7. KR Block expansion: In 1999 due to the benevolent gesture of Sri K. Ramasamy, the ground floor of the Guest House was constructed and inaugurated. Due to the ever increasing visitors to the Sangam it was felt necessary to expand the Guest House. When we apprised Sri Ramasamy about the need for additional rooms, Sri Ramasamy magnanimously offered to construct the first floor of the Guest House (the number of rooms have increased from 5 to 10). The facilities at the Guest House have been commended by one and all.
- 8. Hindu Mission Hospital, Tambaram

Hindu Mission Hospital continued to extend their services both in terms of surgery as well as supply of artificial limbs free of cost. During the year the team from the hospital conducted 9 surgeries besides supplying 25 artificial limbs. It is the support and help extended by such organizations over the years that has helped us to build our confidence to serve the society.

B.Paranthaman, is a boy affected by cerebral palsy (Moderate) which has affected his left leg and hand. He comes from an economically poor family. He has undergone surgery successfully conducted by Hindu Mission Hospital and walks normally. He now resides at our home and studies in the 5th std. As part of the rehabilitation programme he is continuously given therapy.

2. Institution Based Rehabilitation

2.1 Rehabilitation

2.1.1. Home

Home children between ages of five and twelve are provided with free shelter, food, clothing, transportation, medical aid & appliances in the Sangam's Nursery/ High School or for Higher Education outside the campus. They are also provided with special coaching classes.

B. Suresh from Courtallam, aged 10, comes from a poor family consisting of seven members. His left leg is affected and he is suffering from moderate Cerebral Palsy. After his admission at Amar Seva Sangam he underwent corrective surgery carried out by Hindu Mission Hospital, Tambaram, Chennai. He has been rehabilitated by providing accommodation at the home, medical health by providing regular therapy. He is also attending special / integrated school. He is now able to walk normally.

2.1.2. "Sangamam" School for Special Children (Day-Care Centre)

Every day by providing free transport, children who need individual and particular care are brought to the Sangamam School for Special Children. During their stay at the Centre, they are trained in daily living activities, behavioural science, self-care, learning capacity by familiarizing them with the reading / writing and speech besides vocational skills. They are also given physiotherapy. Besides additional health care requirements, they are also provided with nutritious lunch, milk and biscuits all free.

2.1.4 Medical Testing Unit (MTU)

This unit was envisaged and started with Japanese aid in 1998. It being nerve centre is well used by the families of the challenged persons. In view of the importance and popularity of this centre, we have created a separate section for newborn babies who may need physiotherapy attention right from the early stages. This centre's approach is modern and uses items like soft mattresses, mirrors, specific play materials for the children besides adopting new rehabilitation techniques. All the facilities extended to the users are free of cost.

The results are highly encouraging as evident from the increase in the physically challenged persons year after year.

2.1.5. Spinal Cord Injured Post-acute Care Centre

Post surgical care for spinal cord injured are attended to at this centre. The patients are from all over the country. This Centre was started in 2007 and is one of the few in India.

The objective of the centre is long term since, based on the improvement of any patient during his stay at the centre, vocational training is also imparted. Follow-up of discharged patients is also undertaken at the centre. Based on our work and expertise we are striving hard to get recognition for this centre as one of the best maintained spinal cord injured Post-Acute Care Centres in South India. The main aim of the centre is to instill a sense of confidence in the patient that notwithstanding the fact that he may not have been fully cured he returns back to some sort of near normalcy, so that he will be able to look after himself either on his own or with assistance. A multi-gym, an essential facility for treatment at this centre to strengthen muscle, is also being extensively used.

Over the years, 171 students were discharged out of whom 60 have been employed (35%), 13 students have been given higher education (8%).

Status of discharged Disabled Youth Trainees is: male -90, female -81. Year after year, there is a decrease in the occupancy rate of the Hostel; this is due to the fact that a large number of hostel inmates gradually move out and proceed for regular jobs outside. The placements are encouraging.



Ms. Sridevi (23 years) is a case of CP (Monoplegia) and speech impairment with her left leg affected, stays in our hostel. After surgery at Hindu Mission Hospital, Tambaram which released the tendon in her left leg, she is now able to walk with the help of calipers.

2.1.7. SSA-IED (Sarva Shiksha Abiyan)

Central Government has promoted and encouraged this 10 year scheme for the welfare of both normal as well as physically / mentally challenged people. The logistics for the entire operation is to be done through well recognized NGOs. Amar Seva Sangam, being a well established NGO in the field of disabled sector, has been entrusted with running this scheme. Under this scheme we have been allocated seven Blocks of Tirunelveli District.

There has been a dramatic increase in the children with disabilities who have been identified and also enrolled. This is due to the fact that there has been greater in depth door to door campaign to identify such children. Also many parents have accepted disability in their children as a fact of life.

2.1.7.2. Day Care Centres opened

The five Day Care Centres which have been opened in five out of the seven blocks - Tenkasi, Shencottah, Kadayanallur, Alankulam and Vasudevanallur are functioning effectively and the progress of the children are monitored periodically and proper follow up and guidance is given.

2.1.8. National Programme of Rehabilitation for Persons with Disabilities (NPRPD)

Government of India has newly formulated the above programme which aims at ensuring all aids and appliances, scholarships, etc. donated by Government reach the grass-root levels. Under this scheme, Multi-Rehabilitation Workers (MRWs) which is an NGO, function in each Block. There are Community Based Rehabilitation Workers (CBRWs) taking the programme to rural areas by extending the programme to the villages. Amar Seva Sangam has been assigned six blocks which covers 6 MRWs and 126 CBRWs. Adequate training is provided both to MRWs and CBRWs.

Maintenance grants are provided through this scheme for Persons with Mental Retardation / Cerebral Palsy.

2.1.9. Tamilnadu Vazhndhu Kaatuvom Project

Amar Seva Sangam continues to be a Block Disability Facilitating Agency for the above project which is run by the Government of Tamilnadu, Department of Rural Development & Local Administration with the assistance of the World Bank. This project was promoted with a view to reduce poverty of the very poor, disabled and vulnerable people and tribal communities. The objective of this project is to reduce rural poverty by focusing on the poorest of the poor through sustainable support for productive activities and investments, using the community-driven development approach.

Amar Seva Sangam was selected as the implementing agency in view of its vast experience that it has gained in upliftment of the physically challenged and vulnerable people from all walks of life both urban and rural besides extensive exposure in Village Based Rehabilitation programmes. 74 Gram Panchayats under three Blocks have been assigned and we are applying the cluster approach for successful results.

** During 2008-09 grants were given to only those patients who had 80% CP with MR. However in 2009-2010 under government instructions all CP patients with MR s are eligible for maintenance grant.

2.2. Vocational Trainings

Vocational training programmes for Doll making, painting, handicrafts, tailoring, needle work, book binding, note book making and similar other handicrafts are conducted in the Sangam.

2.2.1. Tailoring / Toys / Paintings, etc.,

In 1999, four physically challenged students started tailoring work at the Ann Fischer Vocational Training Centre. Till 2006 it continued to be a tailoring training centre only. However, in view of the excellent work done by the section, during the last three years, considerable orders for uniforms from schools / organizations are being received. There has been a 50 percent increase in the year 2009-10 which fetched an amount of Rs.19 lakhs for uniforms supplied. This section has empowered youth - both normal and physically challenged by giving them employment. As a consequence of the intensive training imparted to them by the tailoring section, seven physically challenged persons have now become full-fledged tailors.

As evidenced by the increasing orders, the tailoring unit has been growing steadily year after year. We wish to state that our staff uniforms are also stitched at our tailoring unit.

We are indebted to M/s. V.V. Minerals, Tisayanvilai, Tirunelveli who continuously support our tailoring section by covering their entire requirement of uniforms for staff/school children from us only. Because of our quality workmanship and promptly adhereing to the delivery schedules we are sure that in the years to come the tailoring section will work to full capacity.

The handicrafts centre makes toys, artificial jewellery, painting on fabric, ceramic, sarees, glass, stone and other allied activities. The centre is always upgrading its quality, bringing out innovative designs such that the items are always in good demand. During the year the staff have also been trained in textile printing with a view to procure orders for the growth of this centre.

This centre also prepares all the mementos the Sangam presents to various visitors besides taking orders of the visitors who are impressed by the work.

2.2.5. Computer / Information Technology Centre

During the year under review Sri Sathya Sai Computer Training Centre which is affiliated to Tamil Nadu Polytechnic (Autonomous), Madurai went through difficult times in view of the fact that we being in a rural area could not compete with centres in Tenkasi, Surandai, etc. However, in view of the advanced hardware available and effective marketing efforts we have slowly come out of the difficulty and while there are already positive signs we are confident that by December 2010 we should comfortably be having nearly 100 students on the rolls. Also experienced and expert staff are likely to take up classes for various languages.

Physically challenged students continue to receive free vocational training.

2.3.5. Education for Empowerment

As part of our educational initiatives we have

- 1. Special study centre for IGNOU distance education and for Alagappa University.
- 2. Tie up with Bhoj University for training programmes and Rehabilitation Council of India in the field of rehabilitation of the disabled.
- 3. Skill development tie up with Tamilnadu Polytechnic, Madurai.
- 4. We have franchising arrangements with few private agencies for training in computers and for training in Chartered Accountancy course.
- 5. With Madras Management Association (MMA) we have arrangement to conduct training programmes of short durations for various soft and management skills.
- 6. In addition to the above along with Centre for Social Initiative and Management, Chennai, we are planning to have management level Social Entrepreneurship training programmes for:
 - a. Social Entrepreneurship outlook programme (SEOP) four months; certificate course (class every Saturday) for heads and senior personnel of NGO - total duration of the course 60 hours.
 - b. Post graduate Diploma Course in Social Initiative and Management (PG DSIM) This is a one year full time course providing solid background knowledge of social issues along with practice.

The purpose of the above programmes are:

- To educationally empower the persons with disabilities in an integrated environment
- To offer skill development opportunities
- To identify and develop persons with entrepreneurial aptitudes and social orientations with capacity building inputs
- To build capacities in persons already engaged in social sectors and to bring out educated and empowered people both disabled and non-disabled, for the benefit of the society

3. Village Based Rehabilitation Initiatives (VBRI)

1) Current Programme

Amar Seva Sangam in the last 4 years of its experience in Village Based Rehabilitation Initiatives (VBRI) has developed from the conceptual stage of involving the Persons with Disabilities and community in the rehabilitation to developing a model whereby they own the responsibilities of rehabilitation, economic development and care-giving and take forward the initiatives of the facilitating organization. Vibrant and proactive disabled groups have been developed and Parents Associations have been formed. Respite Centres for lifelong care-giving for the severely and permanently disabled persons have also been started. The economic activities have grown in the form of increased savings and bank linkages. As a facilitating organization the programme is being implemented through a team of Coordinators, Team Leaders, Social Workers and Community Rehabilitation Workers each being given specific responsibilities with earmarked areas and targets fixed. The entire activity is managed through periodical coordination meetings, planning, budgeting and internally developed reporting systems. Key indicators are developed for impact and activity levels are monitored through a system of computerized managerial information. Databases have been created for various rehabilitation programmes and individualized rehabilitation programmes which are followed up by the central resource personnel of Amar Seva Sangam and course corrections done wherever required.

2. Expected Outcomes

- 1. Generating sustainable models for Community Participatory Rehabilitation of the physically challenged at Medical, Educational and Vocational Levels and for their Care Giving.
- 2. Establishing forums for advocating the problems and issues of the physically challenged and make them a recognisable constituent of the society they live in.
- 3. Creating a common platform on the basis of employment and self-employment of persons with disability.
- 4. Creating assets with the communities' own initiatives for income generation and sustainability of the Self-Help Groups.
- 5. Establishing a Social Developmental Model for the empowerment of the physically challenged by focusing on their abilities and capacity to contribute to the society.

VBRI Final Stage Schedule

The VBRI Final stage of implementation commenced from April 2009.

The last stage is delayed by 21 months on account of difficulties faced while implementing and also rescheduling the programme as per the guidance of CBR forum and ADD India. Two years were allotted to bring the local community to understand the concept of VBR and the SHGs and the role of federations.

The final stage envisages the following:

- + Federations in all the five blocks have been formed.
- + Confederation of all federations and wider level networking have been established.

Handing over to the Federations and the Parents Association

- + A mechanism for addressing the rehabilitation needs for all kinds of disabilities established.
- A forum that would address the mentally challenged persons established.
- Local resource centres managed by the community for meeting the therapy and medical needs would be functional.
- A mechanism for redressing the grievances of parents and persons with disabilities at all local levels.
- + Through the disabled persons' own initiatives the following systems were established.
- (i) For delivery of entitlements from Government sources.
- (ii) For savings and credit management.
- (iii) Linkages with external credit agencies.
- (iv) Networking with other organizations and groups.
- (v) Income generating programmes and their management.
- (vi) Establishment of assets for stability and sustainability of the Groups.

Master Balaji who is living in Alagappapuram which falls in our Sencottah block is aged 7. He is a hemiplegic CP and has a problem with his right hand. After getting regular home based therapy, (part of the initiative of our VBR) he is now better and able to move his hand and fingers also. He is now able to walk better and attends to normal school.

5. Computerisation

Amar Seva Sangam has always given high priority to computerization. In this connection we have the following:

Management Information Systems (MIS) / Hardware solutions: Keeping in mind the need for computerization for various department functions we have our own in-house software. However in view of the ever changing needs in information technology, the staff are well and fully supported by our well wishers at Chennai who upgrade, improve and solve all issues related to software. Not only we have our own software but even the hardware solutions are managed in-house, with the continued support and encouragement received from the good Samaritans at Chennai.

During the current year we intend to introduce new and unique products to improve the efficiency and effectiveness of our information technology. Since our hardware is more than five years old, finances permitting, we may go in for new systems.

Data Base Management (DBMS): All Amar Seva Sangam activities dealing with electronic print media, correspondence and communications as also coordinating and compiling all information and data relating to the Sangam's activities are done at this centralized section. This information is not only useful to monitor the activities internally, much information is also meant for the general public, donors, individuals and well wishers. The main objective of centralizing all computer related works has been achieved by the formation of this department. One more objective that has been achieved is compiling of all old data from books and records to electronic media for easy retrieval.

During the year since the cost of food items (groceries and vegetables) has gone up multifold, it has been found necessary to create data/software to critically monitor this aspect including food consumption. Also we will be shortly incorporating software for stationery items.

6. Exchange Programmes

Programme for distribution of appliances

- The District Disabled Rehabilitation Officer at Tirunelveli conducted a camp, wherein our service users participated and were benefitted by the wheelchairs, calipers, crutches, etc. which were all distributed at the camp.
- The Tirunelveli chapter of Aravind Eye Hospital and Amar Seva Sangam held an Eye Camp for all the inhabitants of villages surrounding the Sangam. This camp was held on March 4, 2010 and 1000 people were benefitted.

Visits by Overseas and Indian students:-

As in the previous years M/s. Teaching Abroad continued to depute through their contacts abroad general public to visit us with the aim of extending voluntary help and at the same time gain valuable experience, knowledge about us as also understanding Indian culture. They are one of the sources through which Amar Seva Sangam's image is projected abroad as a Premier Institution for Disability Management.

Election Booth Checking:

As a consequence of the efforts of the Hony. Secretary, barrier free election booths for the differently abled were implemented by the Government. As a follow-up the Hony. Secretary along with Sangam officials visited and inspected such booths.

Tenkasi Bus Stand Incident

Mr. Rajiv Rajan a CP person and his friend visited Sangam and were returning. At the Tirunelveli bus stand the conductor did not allow them inside the bus. Mr. Rajiv Rajan argued with him but in vain. He immediately brought this issue to Sangam which in turn brought this to the notice of the Collector and the transport department. This resulted in the suspension of the driver and the conductor. Later the driver came to the Sangam for apology.

9. Networking of NGOs

Power Project

It has been decided to tie up with RuTAG, Pondicherry for power projects in the Sangam. RuTAG has promised to help Amar Seva Sangam for the following four projects.

- 1. Solar Lighting in Office
- 2. Power Operation for cutting machine
- 3. Power operation for sewing machine
- 4. Additional facility in Binding Section

Amar Seva Sangam has requested them to render 100% assistance in financial terms. Response from RuTAG is awaited.

10.4 Mumbai Marathon 2010

With a view to make our presence felt in the cosmopolitan, multi cultural financial centre of India viz. Mumbai we participated, like in the previous years, in the Mumbai Marathon that was held on January 17, 2010. The participants were Mr. S. Sankara Raman, Honorary Secretary, Mrs. Ramani Sankara Raman and Mr. A. Ramasubramanian. The fund raised was Rs. 7.9 lakhs an increase of 30% over 2009. In order to mobilize more funds through this event, we will be taking all steps in this direction as early as September 2010. We are confident of getting sizeable donations during the 2011 Marathon.

10.5 Diary Project 2009-10

The Diary project pioneered in 2001 continues to be popular as a source of fund raising since the diaries are more as a souvenir and not a common daily use diary. Besides the high quality it also carries the Sangam's one page insertion along with advertisement materials of corporate well wishers. This is done by charging a nominal fee. Many donors request us to insert their advertisements and also incorporate the corporate logo on the cover. 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NOTES ON ACCOUNTS

1. Significant Accounting policies

a) Trust Overview:

Amar Seva Sangam was incorporated in the year 1981 as a Charitable Trust registered under Tamilnadu Societies Registration Act, 1975 vide certificate No. TSI 16/1981, a model centre catering to all the needs of the disabled.

b) Basis of preparation of financial statements.

The financial statements have been prepared and presented under the historical cost convention on the accrual basis of accounting and comply with the Accounting Standards issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India to the extent applicable. The financial statements are presented in Indian rupees.

c) Use of estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP) requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and the disclosure of contingent liabilities on the date of the financial statements. Actual results could differ from those estimates. Any revision to accounting estimates is recognized prospectively in current and future periods.

d) Fixed assets and depreciation

Fixed assets are carried at cost of acquisition less accumulated depreciation. The cost of fixed assets includes freight, duties, taxes and other incidental expenses relating to acquisition. Depreciation is provided on the written down method as per the provisions of Income tax Act 1961.

e) Inventories

Inventories are carried at the lower of cost and net realisable value..

Cost comprises purchase price and all incidental expenses incurred in bringing the inventory to its present location and condition. The method of determination of cost is as follows:

- finished goods at landed cost on a first in first out method
- □ Stores and spares at landed cost on a first in first out method

f) Retirement benefits

Contributions payable to the recognized Provident Fund, which is a defined contribution scheme, are charged to the profit and loss account.

No provision is made in the books for Gratuity and leave encashment costs, which are not under defined benefit schemes.

g) Revenue recognition

Donations are accounted on cash basis. Earmarked and specific donations are accounted appropriately in the books and the same is utilised for the purpose for which it is received. The funds received on account of non earmarked/general will be used as per the discretion of the Trustees.

Interest on deployment of Corpus funds is recognized using the time proportionate method based on underlying interest rates and 20% of the same is added to specific earmarked funds wherever found prudent or mandated by the donor. In all other cases it is taken to revenue.

h) Foreign exchange transactions

Foreign currency transactions are recorded at the rates of exchange prevailing on the dates of the respective transaction.

i) Provisions and contingent liabilities

The Company recognizes a provision when there is a present obligation as a result of a past event that probably requires an outflow of resources and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation. A disclosure for a contingent liability is made when there is a possible obligation or a present obligation that may, but probably will not, require an outflow of resources. Where there is a possible obligation or a present obligation that the likelihood of outflow of resources is remote, no provision or disclosure is made.

Provisions for onerous contracts, i.e. contracts where the expected unavoidable costs of meeting the obligations under the contract exceed the economic benefits expected to be received under it, are recognized when it is probable that an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits will be required to settle a present obligation as a result of an obligating event, based on a reliable estimate of such obligation.

j) Investment

The Investments are recorded in the books at cost and fixed Deposits at the end of each year include accrued Interest in case of deposits deployed under Reinvestment plan.

2. Previous year's figures have been regrouped/ reclassified wherever necessary to conform to the current year's presentation.

12. General

12.1 Foundation For Excellence (FFE) INC, Mumbai – from 2001

This is yet another philanthropic activity monitored and coordinated by Amar Seva Sangam. 14 financially backward but outstanding students studying in different higher secondary schools, colleges and polytechnics including professional colleges are awarded financial assistance extended by Foundation For Excellence, Mumbai.

12.2 Media coverage

One of the main strengths of the organization has been the wide coverage it has received through the newspapers, TV, Radio, books, journals and magazines. Year after year the coverage is expanding and besides the usual channels, regular newspapers, etc. this year there was an exclusive interview by IBN – TV9 Channel.

12.3 Disaster Management

In the last Annual Report mention was made about formulating a Disaster Management Plan for the Sangam. The same has been prepared and is under scrutiny.

Outlook for the Current Year

The year 2009-10, as you would have seen from the Annual Report, was a significant one for our achievements in the field of Disability Management. This side of the picture was completely overshadowed by the unexpected cost escalation that had an adverse impact on our finance. To eliminate the deficit we have already taken steps for cost cutting, fund raising, increasing productivity and Performance based Incentives. These will be achieved by strict budgetary controls, performance auditing on real time basis, target fixing and graphical review techniques besides training and capacity building.

In this Annual Report we have referred to the proposal for setting up a separate training and development centre in Amar Seva Sangam with the financial assistance from the Rural Electrification Corporation Ltd. (a navratna project of the Government of India). We are happy to inform all our well wishers that REC had sanctioned a grant of Rs.60 lakhs to us for the establishment of a "REC-Amar Seva Sangam Training Centre for the Physically Challenged". The first instalment cheque for Rs.7 lakhs of the grant was presented to ASSA on 23-6-2010 at a simple function held in the Sangam's premises. The civil work is in full swing and the progress of construction is highly satisfactory. As things stand we hope to commission this Centre during the first quarter of the next fiscal year.

As a fund-raising activity we approached Shri Crazy Mohan who instantly offered to stage his hilarious drama "Chocolate Krishna" during October 2010.

One of our regular fund-raising activities is our participation in The Mumbai Marathon. The Secetary, Shri S. Sankara Raman will be taking part in the "Dream Champion Event" of Mumbai Marathon 2011 for the seventh consecutive year. Mrs. Ramani Sankara Raman will run in the "Dream Maker Event". Many people have come forward to run for the Sangam and contribute their mite to ASSA. The event will take place on Sunday, the 16th January 2011. Our modest target is to net a minimum of Rs. one million for which we seek your Wishes and continued patronage.
